

Rum Point

The area of Rum Point was first noted on the 1773 British Admiralty chart of Grand Cayman. Shipwrecks along the reef include *Seagrim*, a Caymanian schooner wrecked in 1919, tragically drowning Captain Fuardato's young wife. Archaeological evidence indicates that turtle butchering, probably by passing mariners, took place along the north coast as early as the 1700s. A small channel through the reef east of Rum Point allowed access to the relatively calm water between the reef and the mainland. Caymanians traveling to and from the landing place at Grape Tree Point, North Side, passed Rum Point on the way to West Bay, George Town, Barchardere, Duck Pond, and other points around North Sound. Islanders tell of courting voyages made along these aquatic trails by suitors going to see their sweethearts.
